A Budget Focused on Educational Goals

On May 17, the community will vote on a proposed spending plan for the 2022-2023 school year. Maintaining all existing programs and services for students, the budget reflects both a commitment to academic excellence as well as a sensitivity to the tax burden placed on residents.

Our approach to developing this budget proposal has been to plan proactively and thoroughly, always with an eye focused on our educational goals. What we have been able to accomplish over the past years during the pandemic is truly amazing and our collaborative approach benefited all. We are so proud of our entire school community.

Planning and preparation continue to be our approach to the development of the \$9,095,698 budget for 2022-2023. The West Valley Central School District uses a multi-year long-range forecast to consider not only the immediate needs for the district, but also to anticipate the impact these decisions may have in the future.

We adopted a spending plan on April 19 that prioritizes cost effectiveness, administrative efficiency, and low per pupil spending. Furthermore, to reduce the impact on local taxpayers, the spending plan strategically incorporates funds from the American Rescue Plan (ARP).

The 2022-2023 budget includes:

- Staying within the tax cap, the 2022-2023 budget proposes a tax levy increase of 1.5% that requires a simple majority vote for approval.
- An estimated tax rate increase of \$0.23 per thousand of assessed valuation.
- A small budget increase due to contractual obligations, utilities increase, as well as pandemic-related expenses to ensure the health, safety, and social-emotional welfare of students.
- Bus Purchase Proposition using funds from the Transportation Reserve so there is NO impact on taxpayers.
- Capital Reserve Proposition to create a Capital Reserve for needed upgrades to the school buildings and grounds.
- The first steps of a phased plan to roll the multiple supports that have been funded through the Federal Stimulus Funds for Education into the general fund to reduce reliance on federal funding that we know will end.

We present this budget proposal to the community with confidence that it meets the school district's mission to prepare all students to excel in a dynamic world while being responsible to the needs of our taxpayers. EXPLANATION OF THREE PART BUDGET PRESENTATION

Chapter 436 of the Laws of 1997 require public school boards of education to present the proposed budget in three parts. As a result, this presentation is organized around the following components: administrative, capital, and program:

- **Administrative Component:** Includes expenses associated with the operation of the school board, superintendent's office, and business office.

Includes salaries and benefits for all certified administrators and supervisors who spend a majority of their time performing administrative duties, consulting costs not directly related to instructional programs, and all other activities that are administrative in nature.

- **Capital Component:** Includes debt service for all facilities financed by bonds and notes of the district, lease expenditures, costs resulting from judgments in tax certiorari proceedings, awards from court judgments, administrative orders and settled claims, cost of construction, acquisition, reconstruction, rehabilitation, and improvements of school buildings, all expenses associated with custodial and maintenance salaries and benefits, service contracts, supplies, utilities, maintenance, and repair of school facilities.
- **Program Component:** Includes salaries and benefits of teachers and any school administrator or supervisor who spend a majority of their time performing teaching duties, and all transportation operating expenses.



SCHOOL BUS PURCHASE – PROPOSITION #2

The 2022-2023 budget provides a line item for the purchase of a 65 passenger IC Bus. The cost of the bus is \$130,750. The budget appropriates the \$130,750 from the Transportation Reserve to cover the cost of the bus. Therefore, there is no impact on your school tax bill as a result. In addition, New York State provides direct aid to schools for transportation expenses. For every dollar spent on the bus purchase the District will receive 74.3 cents back from New York State. This reduces the local taxpayer cost to approximately \$33,603. Bus #92, a 2012 International with approximately 80,000 miles will be traded in and retired from the District fleet.

The District is approximately 64 square miles in size. We have four regular bus runs as well as bus runs that transport our students with special needs. It is a top priority for the Board of Education and school administration to keep the students safe going to and from school.

CAPITAL RESERVE 2022 – PROPOSITION #3

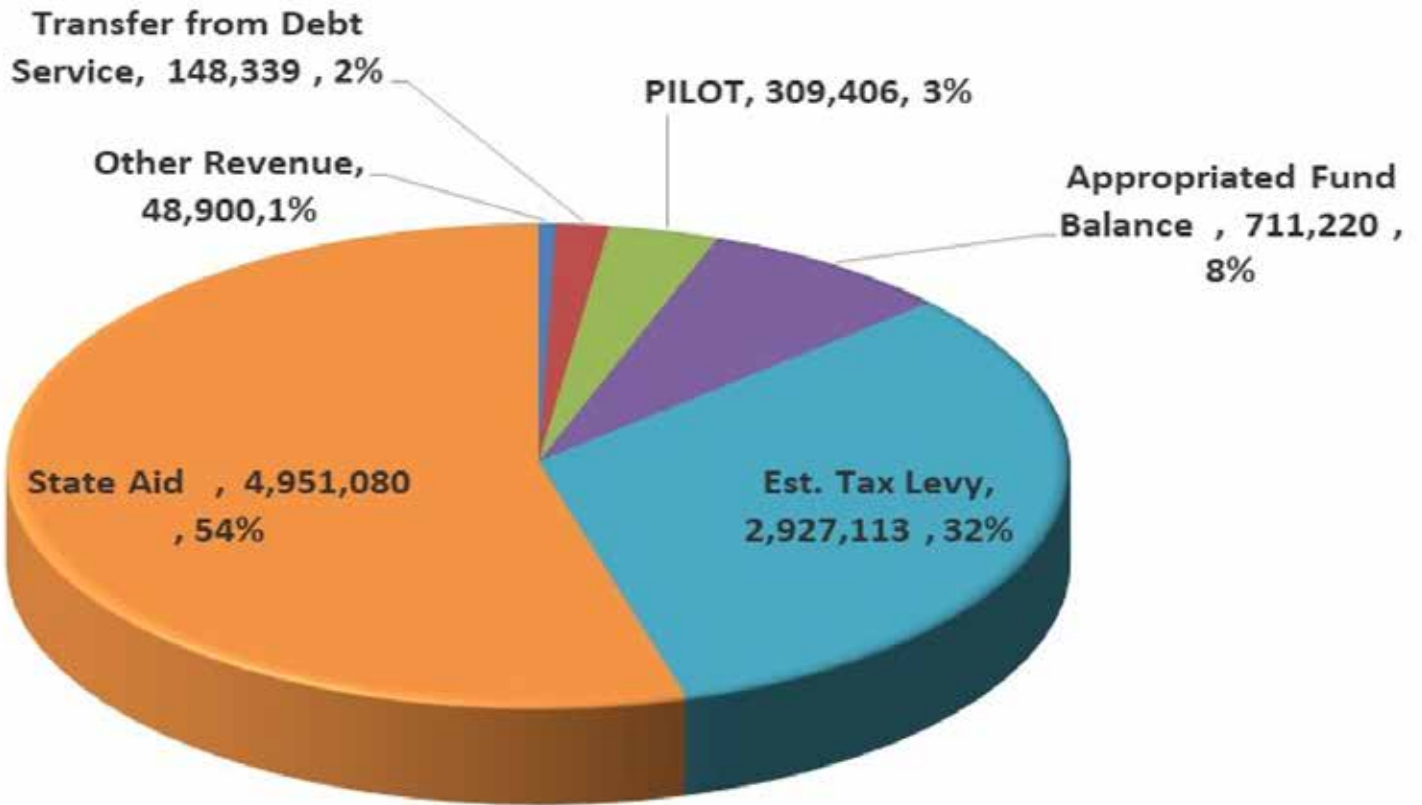
The school budget and election vote will consist of a third proposition which would create a new Capital Reserve up to an amount of \$1,500,000. This will allow the board to create a savings account for needed upgrades to the school building and grounds. In conjunction with the current construction project that will be taking place this year the District will be updating its building condition survey. The survey will assist the Board of Education in developing its next capital project. Priorities will be maintaining a safe and healthy environment for students and staff, replacing aging mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems, and updates to student learning spaces. The life of the Capital Reserve would be 10 years. Creating a new Capital Reserve makes sense. Along with the state aid received on capital projects (85%), it allows the District to maintain and upgrade its infrastructure without increasing the tax rate. Use of the Capital Reserve requires voter approval.

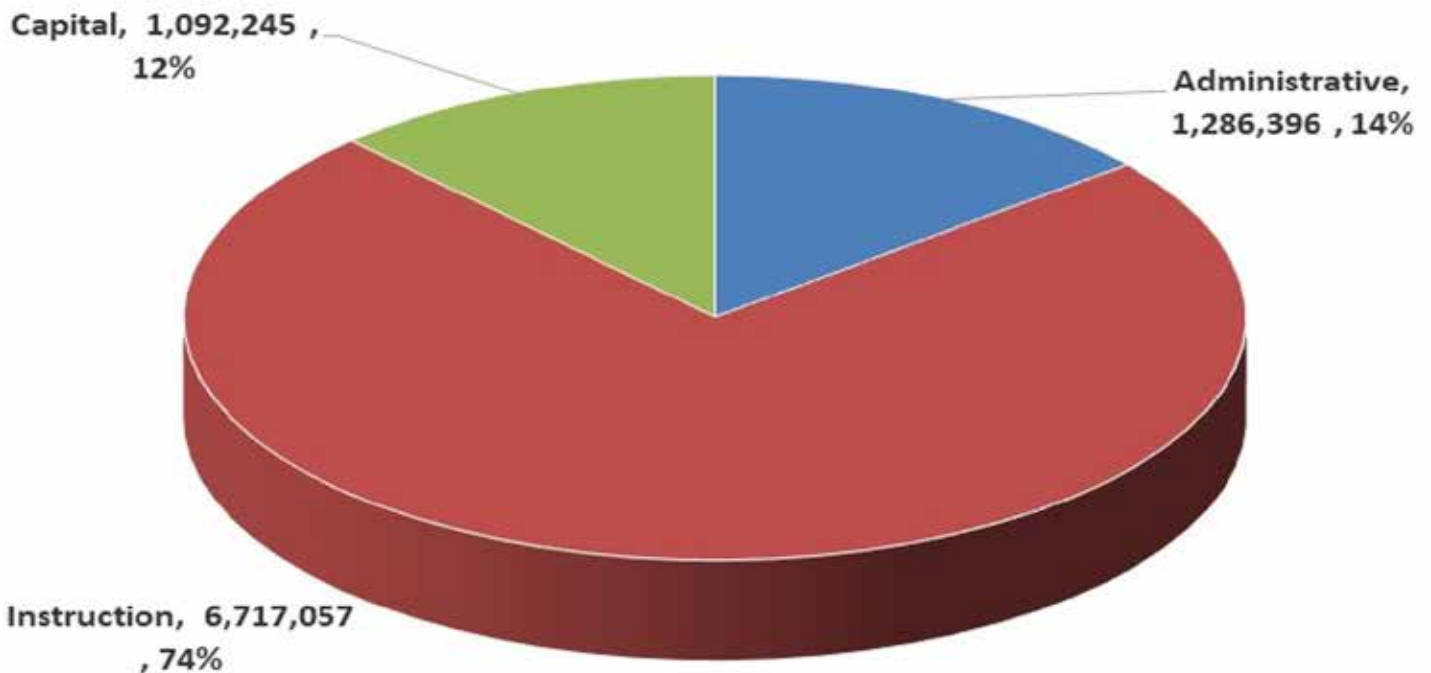

STAR OVERVIEW (SCHOOL TAX RELIEF) OVERVIEW

Available for primary residences

BASIC

- Income limit for BASIC STAR *credit* is \$500,000/
Income limit for BASIC STAR *exemption* is \$250,000
- BASIC STAR is based on the first \$30,000 of full value on a home

ENHANCED

- Provides an increased benefit for senior citizens (age 65 or older) whose annual income is \$92,000 or less
- For 2022-2023, ENHANCED STAR is based on the first \$74,900 of assessed value on a home

CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT 2022-2023

The District would like to continue to undertake small capital projects (less than \$100,000) to maintain and improve its facilities. Thank you for last year's support on this initiative as we gear up this spring to replace interior doors inside the main building.

For the 2022-2023 school year we would like to undertake another small project. The small project would replace one more interior door, the exterior doors by the gym entrance, the flooring between the doors in the gym entrance way, and the flooring in the elevator. There is a line item in the budget (transfer to capital) in the amount of \$100,000. Of the \$100,000, we will receive \$85,000 back in building aid. This leaves the local share at \$15,000. Providing for a capital outlay project each year is an efficient way of taking care of small improvements to the buildings with a minimal impact to the taxpayers.
